

There are 24 games in the “Fun & Games” booklet – of these, 22 are suitable for use in online music lessons as follows:

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| <p><b>LUCKY DIP</b><br/>Works well in online lessons – student can make the cards, so then they have the cards to draw out of the envelope during the lesson</p>                               | <p><b>FIXAPIC</b><br/>Perfect for online lessons – just use screen shots from your online lesson instead of photos (still get parental permission please!)</p> | <p><b>COMPOSATUNE</b><br/>An excellent game for creativity and great while students have more free time! Student can either send, show or play their tune for teacher feedback. If going well, you can extend the number of bars &amp; give less structure</p>  | <p><b>AT THE RACES</b><br/>Works well in online lessons, play as normal</p>  |
| <p><b>FOLLOW ME</b><br/>Excellent for online lessons, great aural training</p>   | <p><b>SLIP UP SLEUTH</b><br/>Works really well in online lessons, play as normal</p>   | <p><b>NOTE ZAP</b><br/>Works well online, teacher can either hold up the notes on screen (or share screen, or send to student). Or, student could write own selection of notes</p>  | <p><b>ENIGMA</b><br/>Works well online – send the extracts (or screen share them) to the student</p>   |
| <p><b>PASS THE TUNE</b><br/>This game will depend on how good your/the student’s internet is. If there is too much time lag, try using phrases rather than bars as the basis for the game.</p> | <p><b>FAMOUS FACES</b><br/>Fun to play in online lessons, play as normal</p>   | <p><b>CHROMATIC COMBO</b><br/>Two ways to use in online lessons:<br/>1. As flash cards – great to learn/revise chromatic notes<br/>2. As game – if student has cards, they play as per rules, but student has all turns! Goal is to match all the pairs, and teacher can check pairs are correct and explain enharmonic matches</p> | <p><b>DOMINO FINGERING</b><br/>Two ways to use in online lessons:<br/>1. As flash cards – great to learn/revise notes &amp; fingerings (cover half the card)<br/>2. As game – works well if student has the cards. They place their hand and teacher’s hand of cards on either side of table, have their turn, then play for the teacher, who can give feedback on matches. Other rules as normal.</p> |

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| <p><b>FISH SCALES</b><br/>Provides a great craft activity for the student (out of lesson time!) making the fish. Fun way to learn or revise scales during lessons.</p> | <p><b>CATCH A BAR</b><br/>This could be played if student can print a copy of the tune and cut it up to stick on the fish, but probably works better in a group or class</p> | <p><b>BAGS THE BEAT!</b><br/>Two ways to use in online lessons:<br/>1. As flash cards – great to learn/revise rhythm notation<br/>2. As game –works well, student or teacher with cards in view of camera. Play as per rules except person with the cards will turn all cards over (ie one from their pile, one from other player’s pile). When player calls out “Bags the Beat!” the cards are added to that person’s pile.</p> | <p><b>PERFECT PRACTICE</b><br/>Helps to keep their home practice interesting! Just need to modify to locations within their home (or backyard) only.</p> |
| <p><b>B72 BLITZ</b><br/>Perfect for online lessons, play as normal</p>   | <p><b>FOOTSTEPS</b><br/>Works well in online lessons if the student is able to make the cardboard squares</p>  | <p><b>STRAW STRENGTH</b><br/>Works well online lesson provided student has a drinking straw and tissue paper</p>   | <p><b>STYLE DETECTIVE</b><br/>Great fun to do in online lessons, play as normal</p>  |
| <p><b>REVERSE GEAR</b><br/>Works well in online lesson, play as normal</p>   | <p><b>MUSICAL WHISPERS</b><br/>Not suitable for online lesson</p>  | <p><b>DICEY DEAL</b><br/>Great for online lessons. Student needs a dice, or they can make one (cut out templates easily found online)</p>  | <p><b>DISAPPEARING DOTS</b><br/>Works well in online lessons, depending on your technical set up (small whiteboard really helpful if you have one)</p>   |
